



# Coalition for Equitable Education Funding

## BACKGROUND

The Fiscal Year 2026 city budget made significant investments to fund a number of important education programs that were at risk of being rolled back or eliminated due to expiring funds. While many of these programs were funded long term, other programs were funded for one year only — meaning the funding will run out at the end of June 2026 unless City leaders act to extend funding.

We are pleased that Mayor Mamdani's Fiscal Year 2027 Preliminary Budget extends and baselines funding for two more of these essential initiatives — preschool special education services and summer programming.

However, the Preliminary Budget leaves out funding for other critical education programs that are currently benefiting thousands of NYC students and their families. The following programs are funded for this year only and are, therefore, at risk of being rolled back or eliminated as soon as this July:

- **Learning to Work programs** to provide support to over-age, under-credited students to help them earn a high school diploma and develop a post-secondary plan (\$31M)
- **Sensory Exploration, Education & Discovery (SEED) programs** for students with intensive sensory needs (\$12M)
- **Infant/toddler (0–2) child care seats** in high-need communities (\$10M)
- **Restorative justice** to help students stay in school and resolve conflicts instead of being suspended (\$6M)
- **Mental Health Continuum** to provide mental healthcare to students at 50 schools (\$5M)
- **Outreach on available early childhood education programs** (\$5M)
- **Immigrant family communications and outreach** to help families receive information about their child's school in a language and mode they can access (\$4M)
- **Student Success Centers** to allow trained youth leaders to build a culture of college-going and help their peers with the college admissions process (\$3.3M)

## RECOMMENDATION

We urge Mayor Mamdani to **baseline funding for these programs** in the FY 27 Executive Budget so that students, families, educators, and providers will know that they can use these programs without the threat that they will be taken away. In addition, we urge the City to make significant additional investments that are needed to support students, with a focus on those who have the greatest needs.
