How to Report Bullying at a School

Your child has the right to go to school where there is no bullying. This fact sheet gives information about how students and parents can report bullying at a school, and what to do if the bullying does not stop. This fact sheet only applies to New York City Department of Education schools, not charter schools.

What should I do first?

There are lots of ways to report bullying. Choose the one that is most comfortable for you.

Report bullying at your school:

- Report the incident to your school's Respect for All Liaison and/or school administration.
- Ask for the incident from school administration to follow up. This is also known as Online Occurrence Reporting System (OORS) number.
- The school will investigate and must tell the parent or guardian • of the target what they find. If needed, the child may be referred for support services.
- If the investigation finds that a student—or students—have been bullying or harassing your child, the school will follow the process described in the discipline code.

Uncomfortable reporting bullying to school staff?

- Make an online complaint at <u>www.nycenet.edu/bullyingreporting</u>.
- Contact the Office of Safety and Youth Development (OSYD): call (718) 935-2288 or 311 or email <u>RespectforAll@schools.nyc.gov</u>.
- OSYD will give you a reference number when you call or email. Keep your reference number. You can also ask for a copy of the OORS report or OORS control number.

If the bullying or harassment is from a school staff member:

- Follow the steps above and/or
- Contact the Office of Special Investigations: call (718) 935-3800 or make a report online at www.nycenet.edu/offices/osi/CPR Form/form.aspx.

TIP:

When you report bullying, your school has to record it in a computer system called OORS (Online Occurrence Reporting System). Ask for a copy of the OORS report or OORS control number.

What do I put in my report?

- Give as much information as you can. Say what happened, who was involved, when it happened, where it happened, and how it harmed your child.
- If you make a report online or in writing, make a copy or take a screenshot. Be sure to note the date, too.
- If you make a report in person or over the phone, write down what you said, who you reported it to, and the date and time.

What do I do if the bullying doesn't stop, the school doesn't give me an OORS report or control number, I don't agree with the description of the incident, or I disagree with the investigation?

- 1. Talk to your Principal again. Ask for an OORS report or OORS control number for your complaint.
- 2. Contact OSYD at <u>RespectforAll@schools.nyc.gov</u>, (718) 935-2288, or by calling 311.
- **3.** Call your school's Superintendent's Office. Look up your school on the DOE website. Then, click on "District Contacts" to find their phone number and email. Explain what happened.
- 4. Seek assistance from escalation staff to coordinate the completion of an open investigation of student-to-student harassment, discrimination, intimidation, and/or bullying, including sexual harassment by completing this <u>Escalation Staff Assistance Request Form</u> and sending it to the Family Support Coordinator for the superintendent that oversees your school. You can find your Family Support Coordinator using this <u>School Search</u> feature.
