

- Free full-day program (6 hrs & 20 mins)
- Run by the DOE
- Starts in September of the year child turns 3
- All children are eligible to apply but not all children are guaranteed a seat
- Some programs offer extended hours and yearround services

DOE 3-K Settings



District Schools

- DOE public elementary schools.
- Overseen by the school's principal.

Pre-K Centers

 Run by DOE offering pre-K and 3-K classes only.

NYCEECs

 NYC Early Education Centers are community-based organizations.

Family Child Care

 Home-based programs with licensed professionals for children from birth to three.

One Proof of Child's Age

• Birth certificate, passport, record of baptism

Two Proofs of Address

Lease, deed, mortgage statement, utility bill, rent receipt, government ID


You do not need to provide proof of citizenship or a Social Security number.

Students in Temporary Housing have a right to immediate enrollment

- Find seats for the remainder of the 2023-2024 school year for children born in 2020 (3-K) and 2019 (Pre-K) using the "Need A Seat Now" filter.
- Contact programs directly to ask about seat type and to register.

- Register even if you're missing documents
- If there is an open seat, child can attend even if you're missing documents
- Can stay in program even if change address
- Monthly MetroCard for parents
- Possibly busing
- DOE Regional Managers

Students in Foster Care

Foster Care Agencies

- Provide Case Planners or Education Specialists
- Assist with application and enrollment process

Immediate Enrollment

- To programs with open seat
- Even if can't provide documentation

School Stability

• Can stay in program when child is placed in foster care or changes foster homes.

Transportation

- MetroCards
- Possibly busing

Students With Disabilities



Students with more significant needs may require a more supportive setting.

Special Class in an Integrated Setting

- Smaller class size
- Students with and without IEPs
- Special education teacher

Special Class

- Small class size (6, 8, 12)
- All students with IEPs
- Special education teacher

If these are recommended on IEP, the CPSE is responsible for finding a program for the child. The DOE will provide busing. Contact EarlyChildhoodBusing@schools.nyc.gov with transportation questions.

- Run by the DOE
- Free and low-cost programs
- Serve children from 6 weeks old to 3 years
- Offer extended hours (up to 10) and yearround services
- Only for <u>qualifying</u> families

Infant & Toddler, Extended Day/Year Programs

Financial Need And Other Factors

- Public assistance, low income and need child care because of job or education, active cases with ACS, living in temporary housing, or receiving domestic violence services
- Some parents need to pay a fee based on a sliding scale

- Early Head Start: Pregnant mothers, infants & toddlers
- Head Start: 3 to Kindergarten

Eligibility

 Low Income, Temporary Housing, Foster Care, or Receiving Public Assistance

- Apply directly or through 3-K and Pre-K application
