#### Who Can Enroll in School

Between what ages does a child have the *right* to attend school in NYC?



Children between the ages of 4 and 21\* have the right to attend a public school. They can stay in school until they graduate or until the year they turn 21, whichever occurs first

Between what ages is it mandatory for children to be in school?



6 to 17 years


Does immigration status of the child or the parents matter?



**No.** Your child has the right to go to school regardless of their immigration status or your family's status.



#### Does Immigration Status of Family Matter?



- No. Your child has the right to go to school regardless of his or her immigration status, or your family's immigration status.
- No one can ask you about your immigration status. If someone knows, they must keep it confidential.
- If a document asks for a social security number, simply leave it blank.
- Students are entitled to receive all school services, including free lunch, free breakfast, transportation, and educational services, even if they or their family are undocumented.



# Language Access Rights



You have the right to receive translation and interpretation services in NYC Public Schools

## **Translation**

- Letters
- Forms
- Meeting notices
- Report cards
- Special education documents

# Interpretation

- Parent-teacher conferences
- IEP meetings
- Suspension hearings
- Special education hearings
- At any DOE office

If you need assistance with T&I services, ask your child's school for assistance or call 718-935-2200.



# Parent-Teacher Conferences

You have the right to attend Parent-Teacher conferences with interpretation/translation provided by the DOE.

- If you need an interpreter, let your child's teacher know before the day of the conference.
- Parent conferences start this week!

Schedule an appointment with your child's school if no one has reached out.

Prepare questions ahead of time.

#### Pre-K

If your child is accepted, they can start 3K in September of the year they turn three.

# The Right to Choose a School



#### Kindergarten:

 If a child is eligible to begin Kindergarten in September, can apply to schools from November – January of the preceding school year.

#### Middle School:


• Middle schools (grades 6-8) may have virtual visits and fairs so that parents can learn about the different options available. The middle school application process usually begins late fall/winter of your child's fifth grade school year.

#### High School:

• Every fall, the DOE hosted high school fairs for students and parents. Families can visit, virtually for now, high schools that interest them. The high school application process usually begins late fall/winter of your child's eighth grade school year.

MySchools is a DOE website where you can explore schools/programs and APPLY online to Middle School and High School!



#### What happens if you do not apply to schools?



For Middle Schools, parents who do not participate in the application process must enroll their children in their zoned school.

To find your zoned school, call 311, visit the DOE website, or contact your local Family Welcome Center ("FWC").

For students entering High School, they must contact the Family Welcome Center.

•  $2^{nd}$  Step  $\rightarrow$  must go to the assigned school to complete registration

("ELLs")



#### Rights of English Language Learners (ELLs)



Students who speak a language other than English at home and who need support in school to learn English are called **English Language Learners** (ELLs).

You have the right to participate in the process of identifying your child as an ELL.

If your child needs help learning English, you have the right to choose a bilingual or ENL (English as New Language) program.

Students who are ELLs must receive support until they can read, write, and speak in English.



# **ELL Programs**

#### English as a New Language (ENL)

- English Only
- Goal is to learn English
- Teacher does not have to speak home language

#### Transitional Bilingual Education (TBE)

- Classes taught in English and home language
- Goal is to learn English
- At first, use home language to learn English
- Then eventually no longer use home language

#### Dual Language (DL)

- Bilingual
- Classes taught in both English and home language
- Goal is for student to be bilingual





# ELL Programs, Cont'd



What happens if my child's school does not have a bilingual program available?

• If your child's school does not offer a bilingual program in your child's home language, your child is entitled to transfer to another school in the district that offers it.

Parents can ask for a school transfer by reaching out directly to the school or visiting the nearest FWC.



## NYSITELL v. NYSESLAT

#### **NYSITELL**

- New York State Identification
   Test for English Language
   Learners
- Test given to students within 10 school days of enrolling in school
- Determines the level of child's English abilities

#### **NYSESLAT**

- New York State English as a Second Language Achievement Test
- Students placed in bilingual or ESL classes must take this test once every year in the spring to determine if they are still considered ELLs



# Testing Accommodations for ELLs



Separate Location

Third Reading of Listening Section of English Language Arts Exam

Bilingual Dictionaries and/or Glossaries

Written Translations of Tests (other than English Language Arts)

Oral Translation of Tests for Low Incidence Languages (other than English Language Arts)

NOTE: Language accommodations are not provided during NYSESLAT exam.



# The Rights of ELLs With Disabilities



## **ELLs** with Disabilities



Schools must give students with disabilities a free education that is appropriate

ELL Students with disabilities have the right an appropriate education and to ELL academic services

ELL students with disabilities have the right to receive bilingual special education



# What is bilingual special education?

Services provided to students who are ELLs and have disabilities

Bilingual evaluations

Bilingual special education classrooms

Bilingual related services



# Rights of ELLs who are Struggling in School

If your child is at risk for repeating a grade, the school should tell you this at the parent-teacher conference, but not later than February 15.

These students have the right to receive reading and math help, called "Academic Intervention Services."

Summer school is offered to students starting in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade who are at risk of repeating a grade.



# Testing and Promotion Criteria



#### **Promotion Criteria**



K-2<sup>nd</sup> grade: The decision to promote the student to the next grade is made with the school principal, the child's teacher, and the student's parents.

**Grades 3-8:** Promotion is based on a variety of factors including: student's classwork, grades, and statewide testing results.



#### High School Graduation Requirements



**Grades 9 to 12:** For grades 9-12, promotion is based on the credits your child earns. To move on to the next grade, your child needs to earn:

- Grade 9 8 credits
- Grade 10 20 credits
- Grade II 30 credits
- Grade 12 44 credits (total for graduation)

For graduation, students also need 90% attendance

HS Diploma: Need to pass 4 Regents + I State-approved exam of your choice to graduate.

How to obtain your child's creation code?

- Visit your child's school
- Call your child's school
- Ask for a letter from school

- Call 311



# Tips!



Keep your child's school records and all letters and notices in a file

Put everything in writing.

Send all important information by certified mail, requesting confirmation of delivery; or by fax with confirmation. Keep proof that it was sent.

Talk to staff who works with your child. Talk to teachers when things are going well and not going well. Show that you are a concerned and involved parent.

Be persistent. If someone says that there is nothing you can do for your child, get a second opinion.
