





What is a random number?

A random number is a long string of letters and numbers, for example: B51920AF-F1C6-40EC-8E9A-3E1E50CB13BB (this is a real random number!). Random numbers are used in admissions to determine the order in which students are matched to schools during admissions. These numbers are sorted in numeric and then alphabetical order like this: 0, 1, 2 ... 9, A, B, C, D, E, F.

For example, when the following two random numbers are sorted, the number that begins with "5" comes first:

- 1. 5B1920AF-F1C6-40EC-8E9A-3E1E50CB13BB
- 2. B51920AF-F1C6-40EC-8E9A-3E1E50CB13BB



Process



Offers will be made in Spring (March/April)

Waitlisted at any school listed above match

Can join waitlist (but will be at the bottom)

Check waitlist in real time

Screens

Some schools screen for grades or have auditions, check in myschools

Location

Some prioritize students in their zone, district, or borough

Diversity

Some prioritize low-income students, Multilingual Learners, and students in temporary housing

Lottery

Lottery for each priority group if more applicants than seats

HS Admissions Methods



Specialized

- SHSAT screened
- Offers based on score

Screened/ Audition

- Based on 7th grade core class average
- Some require essay, interview, audition, etc.

Ed Opt

- Take a range of academic levels
- Some seats are filled through ranking, others random



HS Admissions Methods



Screened Language

- For multilingual learners
- Consider time in US, language proficiency, etc.

Transfer


- For older students
- Check program age and academic requirements

Zoned & Open

- If you live in Zoned school area, just apply
- For Open, take anyone, random ranking



Chances of offer: High, Medium or Low





- High school students will see an icon indicating whether they have a high, medium, or low chance of receiving an offer
- Based on the applicant's admissions characteristics like grades, priority group, etc.
- The DOE has more detailed information about this on their <u>chance</u>





Screened schools: Rank students



Middle school based on 4th grade scores

High School based on 7th grade scores

Different ranking groups based on core class grades



Audition





Students prepare a vocal, musical instrument, drama, dance, or art portfolio piece

Screened Language





Students are matched based on English proficiency or a specific language spoken at home.




Continuing students

Guaranteed match regardless of available seats for K-8 or 6-12 schools





Zoned & Geographic



Students receive priority/guarantee based on where they live.

Seats for Students with IEPs




If more than 20% of classes (not lunch) are special ed (SETSS, ICT, Small class)

Students with disabilities (SWD) set aside

Special Education Admissions



Students with IEPs apply the same way as other students

New school MUST implement the IEP.

Any change must be based on student's needs NOT school's program! BUT REALITY CAN BE COMPLICATED!

Only apply to programs you'd be happy to attend

Rank your TRUE preferences

Make your last pick a "safe school"

Look into schools with multiple programs



Language Access Rights: Translation & Interpretation

Arabic, Bengali, Chinese, French, Haitian-Creole, Korean, Russian, Spanish, Urdu

NEW! Albanian, Uzbek and Ukrainian

Translation:

- letters
- forms
- meeting notices
- report cards
- special education documents

Interpretation:

- parent-teacher conferences
- parent association meetings
- suspension hearings
- meetings with school staff
- special education meetings
